ABOUT THE CITY LOOP SHUTTLE

The City Loop Shuttle operates on a circular route to areas within downtown Portland. It is a transportation service, not a narrated guided tour.

GUIDED TOURS

Guided tours are available from various tour operators throughout the Old Port. Many operate from Long Wharf or Pearl Street, a short walk from the terminal.

Check with Visit Portland staff for all tour opportunities.

Note: Portland's working waterfront and the Old Port are within walking distance from Ocean Gateway.

RULES OF RIDING THE SHUTTLE

All rides begin and end at Ocean Gateway (Stop 1)

Passengers are expected to hop on and off the shuttle to explore other areas throughout the city. They should not remain on the shuttle for all 10 stops.

When you hop off the shuttle, you may hop back on at any stop along the route.

When the coach returns to the terminal, ALL PASSENGERS must get off to allow for additional visitors to utilize the service. Passengers waiting to board will be given seating priority before exiting passengers may reboard, ensuring there is room for everyone.

OPERATING HOURS + TIMING

Operating hours are not fixed but dynamic and subject to change. They are determined by various factors, including ship arrival and departure time, weather conditions, availability of additional vehicles, and staff.

The shuttle is designed to run on a 30 to 45-minute timetable. However, it may not reliably operate on this timetable due to unforeseen conditions such as weather, city traffic backups, and the availability of additional vehicles and staff.





Congress St. at Oak St.

A neighborhood bustling with galleries, theatres, and other venues for live entertainment, here the Portland Museum of Art (PMA) anchors Portland's Arts District. PMA houses more than 22,000 works of art, with featured works ranging from Andrew Wyeth to Picasso.

7 MONUMENT SQUARE: 🚷 🚻 🦰 🚫 🔘 Congress St. at Center St.

Rich in culture and history, this neighborhood connects the Arts District and the Old Port. Tour the childhood home of celebrated poet Henry Wadsworth Longfellow or peruse the Portland Public Library rotating art exhibits. Walk around and enjoy the heart of Portland. Restroom is in the Portland Public Library.

6 CITY HALL: (1) (1) (2) Congress St. at Myrtle St.

Considered the "Top of the Old Port," you will find Portland's City Hall, built between 1909 and 1912. Its tower measures 200 feet and was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1973. Across the street is a post office, and the restroom is in City Hall.

TOMMY'S PARK AND POST OFFICE PARK: Middle St. at Franklin St. Each cobblestone plaza is treelined and offers plenty of shade and benches to enjoy a book or wander the surrounding pubs, restaurants, shops, and galleries. Congress St **EAST BAYSIDE** 10 PORTLAND OCEAN TERMINAL: ARTS DISTRIC India St. at Commerical St. Home to Portland's first cruise ship terminal and Casco Bay Lines, serving the island communities outside Portland Harbor. It is part of the Working Waterfront and adjacent to the historic Old Port. Restrooms are located in the Casco Bay Lines

(5) TOP OF CONGRESS STREET:

Congress St. at India St.

This East End neighborhood features the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, Portland's largest Catholic church. Taking our public bus service to Freeport? Hop off here as this stop is also a Metro stop for the Freeport bound Breeze public bus service. Across the street is a commercial pharmacy.


Washington Avenue, a hotspot known for its fine restaurants, distilleries. and artisans. A variety of cultures make this a vibrant, fast-changing neighborhood. It also serves as a gateway to the bustling East Bayside area, where more breweries, distilleries. and artists call home.

(3) MUNJOY HILL: (X) (**)

A neighborhood of classic 3-story

walk-ups built to house the early Italian and Irish immigrants who worked on the waterfront. Nearby is a great photo opportunity on North Street: Fort Sumner Park has excellent views of Portland's Back Bay and Mount Washington. Tour The Portland Observatory, the historic maritime signal tower built in 1807.





1 OCEAN GATEWAY: ? (1) (1) (2) (3) Thames St. at Hancock St.

Features a year-round Visitor Information Center with free WiFi, public restrooms, and friendly Visit Portland ambassadors to help you navigate your stay in Maine.



Offers a fantastic view of Casco Bay and its islands. This park has a playground and benches to enjoy a picnic lunch or grab a bite from one of Portland's several renowned food trucks.
